With 100 years of development our club has become the amazing place we all can enjoy today. It is no small task to have all that is available to us which was made possible by members volunteering their time to make it. Volunteering offers numerous benefits, both for the individuals who volunteer and the club. The easiest way to find opportunities for work hours is to check the club calendar www.beloitrifleclub.org/events/ to see when things are happening. Most of the event can use a help setting up, scoring, cleaning up or even mowing the lawn. Through the summer we have general work days when project and club maintenance is performed. That could be anything from painting, repairs on ranges or construction. Check with Brad Mueller on general work day opportunities. When volunteering at the club it is the members' responsibility to have their membership card with them so work hours can be recorded. Without the time recorded on your membership card you won't get the credits for

membership renewal. Only board directors are able to sign for work hours, but it is the members responsibility to present the card so make sure to have it with you whenever you visit the club. Another reason to have your card with you is the list of contacts for the directors in case you have a question or to report a problem.

Center Fire Bench Rest Matches will be conducted on the following dates and are open to all BRC members. There is NO fee to participate. Matches are held from 9:30 AM - 12:00 noon. These are informal Matches. They will be conducted on:

July 15, July 29, Aug 5, Aug 19

Standard Operating Rules For 500 Meter Range

- 1. Red Badge Certified Members Only. Red Badge must be worn.
- 2. All Shooters must sign in prior to shooting. (A sign-in sheet will be in the shed next to the guest sign-in sheet. Sign in with date, name, time in/out.)
- 3. All shooting to be done from the bench top only. (No prone or standing are allowed.)
- 4. Every time prior to using 200/300/500m range, rifle and ammunition must be fired at 100 yards, a 2 shot 3 inch group must be held to move to 200/300/500m distances. Please note that now once you have gotten your red badge, you only need to fire 2 shots at 100 yards to proof your rifle's zero before shooting on the 500 meter range.
- 5. MINIMUM MUZZLE VELOCITY MUST EXCEED 2300 FT PER SEC-OND. If in doubt do not shoot until you can get chronographed.
- 6. Only BRC provided steel targets allowed.
- 7. When 'cease fire' is called, properly display Hot/Cold sign with warning light. "Cold" means it is safe to go down range. Warning lights to be on when range is cold. "Hot means the range is active. Do not go forward of the firing line.
- 8. No handling of firearms when range is Cold.
- 9. All firearms must be racked or cased & off the firing line with bolts open or chamber indicated and magazines removed when range is Cold.
- 10. Bench rest, BR-50, CMP and Highpower disciplines have control of the entire firing line during their matches. All lanes will be closed to non-participants at that time.
- 11. Check website for the times when the disciplines have matches scheduled.

500 Meter Range

The 500 Meter Range consists of 18 shooting benches, the first 12 are for general use by all members and their guests. The benches are numbered 1 thru 18 from left to right. BENCHES 13 THRU 18 ARE POSITIONED FOR USE OUT TO 500 METERS AND ARE ONLY TO BE USED BY THOSE BRC MEMBERS WHO HAVE GONE THROUGH THE QUALIFICATION PROCESS FOR THAT RANGE. NO GUEST IS ALLOWED TO USE THIS PORTION OF THE RANGE.

The following club members are authorized to qualify members on the 500 Meter Range:

The qualification process is posted in the club house and on the bulletin board at the 500 meter range. That process is:

- 1. Shoot a 3 shot group a 100 yards to verify rifle zero.
- 2. Obtain bullet weight and velocity.
- 3. Calculate the necessary sight change to impact at 500 meters (547 yards).
- 4. Prove proper sight adjustment from calculations in step "3" by shooting another 3 shot group at 100 yards with the calculated adjustments made to your sights. The group should be 9 inches to 17 inches high depending on bullet speed and weight.
- 5. After the rifle is properly adjusted to strike high at 100 yards, the shooter to be qualified must fire 4 shots at 500 meters; all shots must strike within a 20 inch square steel plate. More than 4 shots are allowed as needed.
- 6. Upon completion of the above orientation, the member's name and \$10.00 processing fee, will be forwarded to Jon Nortemann. A special "RED 500 Meter" badge, with the members name will be made for the member to wear. The member will also have his/her membership card signed to substitute for the badge until it arrives.

THE 500 METER RANGE IS FOR QUALIFIED BRC **MEMBERS** ONLY! NO GUESTS! We have over 300 members qualified. Before members may use the shorter range target boards, 200 meters, 300 meters and steel targets, which co-exist on the 500 Meter Range, they MUST BE QUALIFIED AT 500 METERS. Guests are not allowed to use the shorter ranges on the 500 Meter Range at any time or the 500 meter target boards and steel targets. NOTE: ONLY QUALIFIED BRC MEMBERS ARE ALLOWED TO USE THE 500 METER RANGE, BENCH POSI-TIONS 13 THRU 18 REGARDLESS OF THE RANGES AT WHICH **BACKSTOPS AND TARGET** BOARDS ARE INSTALLED.

I will be qualifying members to use the 500 meter range on any Wednesday morning that the 'Wednesday Morning Group' shoots, between 9:00 AM and noon. You may call the other 10 members to set up other times if needed. If you are shooting a caliber that is damaging our steel targets and/or range facilities, PLEASE STOP. This club belongs to each BRC member and needs to be treated with respect. Normal wear and tear is expected but should not be accelerated. Thank-you.

Remember: These Are Rules

- 1. No unintended discharge of a firearm.
- 2. No rounds to leave the range.
- 3. Wear your safety glasses and hearing protection
- 4. ALL members, whether new this year or a 40 year plus veteran have a duty to see that our rules and procedures are followed. Politely remind each other if infractions are observed. We have a 'jewel' of a club. Please keep it that way. THANK YOU!
- 5. No 50 BMG's to be used on Club grounds at any time!
- 6. Always wear your Membership Badge.

Black Powder - The York Shoot

Every year in June, the Beloit Rifle Club/Black Powder Lodge hosts the Wisconsin State Sanction Sergeant Alvin C. York Over the Log Shoot or CGM - 60 yd. shoot. CGM - Meaning Chunk Gun Match. It is called this because you rest the muzzle of your rifle over a log or chunk of wood. Alvin C. York was the most decorated soldier of WWI. We honor him with this shoot because he shot in these types of matches before and after WWI. This type of shooting was a great pastime for the men who lived in the mountains of Tennessee where Alvin York was born and raised. Having the beef shoots, as they were called back then, was a way to see who was the best marksman of that area. They also helped put food on the table. Some times it was a way for the farmer that raised the beef or turkey to get more money for the animals he raised by putting them up for a shoot. The money that was paid to enter the shoot went to the farmer. His beef cow was the prize. 1st and 2nd place got the hind quarters, 3rd and 4th place got the front quarters, and 5th place would get the hide and tallow of the beef cow. 6th place shooter got to dig the lead out of the tree!

Howard Hawks made a movie for Warner Brothers in 1941 called "Sergeant York". It was about the life and times of Alvin C. York. If you can't find a DVD of the movie, you can find all the information about Sergeant York by going on the website: www.sgt.york.org.

Like I have already stated the Black Powder Lodge puts on the Annual WI Sergeant York Shoot each June and the proceeds

from the shoot are sent to Deborah York, who is the Executive Director of the Sgt. York Patriotic Foundation in Pall Mall, Tennessee.

Last year June 2022 the WI York Shoot was cancelled because of rain. Due to everyone's calendar for the year being full, it wasn't rescheduled. This year's Annual WI York Shoot was partially cancelled due to excessive heat. Registration opened at 8:00 a.m., the temperature was 84 degrees, the match was to start at 10:00 a.m. with practice prior to that. The match didn't start until about 10:45 due to shooters

coming late. Each shooter gets at least 3 shots practice to establish a group so that he can put his match target behind the group in hopes that he gets a good shot on his match target. By noon the temperature was 90+ degrees.

Ten shooters showed up to shoot the 10 shot CGM 60 yard match. The shortest string of the ten shot match scored with calipers would be the winner. The next shortest would be second and so on down the line. We paid 5 places plus the sweetest shot or the best shot of the whole match.

With the match starting close to 11:00 a.m., I

knew I was in trouble. I was shooting a Flintlock rifle in this match and you have to use a flash or splashguard in between the shooters so that the shooter you are laying next to does not get sprayed with your priming powder when the shot goes off. My splash guard is a grey board with a sign on it that states: "Sometimes you gotta pull out your big guns!". There's where the problem started. I was using a Flintlock rifle that was way too much gun for me to handle on such a hot day. The rifle is a 50 caliber muzzleloader with a 50-inch long barrel that is 1-3/8 inches across the flats. The rifle weighs 28 pounds. I have to stand on a stool to load the gun. The match is shot in the prone position so I have to use pads on my pointed elbows and pads for my knobby knees. About half way thru the match, I was beat. The hotter it got, the worse I shot. I just wanted this match to end. But do you know what, I wasn't the only one standing on a stool to load. Several shooters use a stool to stand on while they clean and load. You use a stool for the long barrels so that your arms don't get as tired working the ram rods up and down.

As I stated before the shoot was partially canceled. After we get down with the ten shot match we hold side matches for various shoot related prizes that the shooters donate. We charge \$1.00 - \$2.00 per shot for the side matches, we use this time for the score keepers to tally p all the scores from the 10 shot match. Well we had to cancel the side matches, no one wanted to shoot any more in the 90 plus degree weather. We usually make

between fifty to seventy-five dollars in the side matches. But not this year. I know I didn't feel like shooting in them, I had enough fun for the day. With the scoring all done, it was time to award the prizes. I must say we didn't have a beef cow to split up, but we did have some nice prizes. The first place shooter was Will Elliot from Port Edwards, WI. He received a nice framed W.M.L.A. sanctioned certificate. a pound of black powder, a crystal eagle, and five gold dollars, and a blue ribbon. His score was a 8.323 inch string. Second place received a pound of black powder, four gold dollars and a second place ribbon. Dan Bredberg of Carbon Cliff, IL shot 2nd with a score of 8.412 inch string, Larry Rackow from Janesville, WI shot 3rd with a 11.056 inch string. He won three gold dollars and a ribbon. Bob Biermann from Rockford, IL shot 4th place and won two gold dollars and a ribbon with a score of 11.087

inch string. Paul Swanson of Rockford, IL came in 5th place with a 12.819 inch string and won one gold dollar and a ribbon. The best shot of the whole match was won by Paul Swanson of Rockford, IL with a score for match 9 of 0.167 of an inch. He received a framed certificate and a big bottle of Back 40 maple syrup. Oh yeah, what was my score, well I shot a 10 shot string that scored 16.804 inches and received lots of sun for my efforts. Like they say, maybe next time.

Prior to the 10 shot match we all faced the flag for what I call the nation's prayer – The Pledge of Allegiance. The flag that we faced is the flag that the York family gave to me for putting on the WI Sergeant Alvin C. York shoots. The flag is one of the flags that flew over Sergeant York's grave in Pall Mall, TN. A treasured possession! I would like to thank everyone who helped put on the 2023 WI Sergeant Alvin C. York shoot, too many to mention, and also the members of the BRC that allowed me to send the proceeds from the shoot to the Sergeant Alvin C. York Patriotic Foundation.

Through our efforts I was able to send over \$220 to the Sergeant Alvin C. York Patriotic Foundation.

From the Chief Range Officer

Summer is here, hope you are enjoying our amazing range. Now is a good time to consider a discipline that you are curious about. You can check the calendar to find events that you can participate in or even just go observe.

We have seen numerous members bring guests. Remember that you are totally responsible for the actions and compliance of rules for your guests. Signing in and paying the guest fee prior to use of the range as well as mandatory use of Ear and Eye protection by guests and yourself is your responsibility. Members must stay with their guests at all times and should be observing the actions of their guests, not shooting while the guests are. Some of the complaints we have become aware include using targets that aren't approved by the club. Club steel in the club placed location or your paper targets only. We have had a few violations such as shooting jacketed bullets on the cowboy range and rapid fire. We have observed some lax muzzle control too. If you see violations, politely make corrections or notify myself, executive board members or the discipline director in a timely manner.

Holster draw is now approved on the Defense and East Bay ranges for the members that have been certified. There is a separate certification for the cowboy range. If you want to be certified, contact the director for one of those ranges. An up-to-date rule book is available on the club web site. Please check it out, follow the rules and have a great time at the Beloit rifle club!
